

• Visegrad Fund



In April 15 students and their teachers from our school travelled to Gdansk, Poland for a Visegrad Fund supported exchange program. After flying from Budapest to Warsaw we had some hours before taking a bus to Gdansk to explore the capital city.

The first morning commenced at the school, where the students were divided into two groups. The first group visited the biggest urban gallery in the country in a district named Zaspá. While we discovered the history of Poland through the murals we dealt with tasks about them online. The second group stayed in the school and made ceramics with Hungarian and Polish folk motifs.

On the second day a city game was planned but it was deferred because of the bad weather. Instead of the game we went to the old town for a walk. We spent our

afternoon in the laser zoltar, engaging in team laser battles. Some students also tried out a 9D cinema.

On Wednesday we visited a museum named Solidarity. This museum was about how the Polish society fought against the communist rule. The afternoon and evening the students spent with their host families.

The final day began with a workshop where we made colorful murals with the instructions and help of the famous street artist Tuse, whose murals can be found everywhere in the city. After the workshop we created mind maps, posters about our exchange program in Pécs and Gdansk. In the evening a party was organized at the school where the students could sing karaoke or play football and basketball and the teachers ordered pizza for dinner.

In the early morning on Friday the students left the city by train and flew back from Warsaw to Budapest.

These days in Gdansk and also in Pécs were very beneficial and enjoyable because we could visit another country, get to know other people and learn from each other about the culture, language and history through using our English knowledge.

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
